Activity 5



Showing kindness to others does not just have to mean those we don't know, serving others can include our family too.

No two families are alike. Your family may have many members, or only a few. You may live with two parents or one. You may stay with your grandparents, an aunt and uncle, or a guardian. What makes your family different from other families? What makes it special?

All families experience difficulties. The Book of Ruth is about a family in crisis.

Read Ruth to learn about the difficulties the family went through. What held the family together when things were hard?

Leaders may want to invite a family counselor, psychologist, corps officer or pastor to talk to your troop about family dynamics and strategies for problem solving during difficult or stressful times.

Activity 6



Our friendships are also important relationships in our lives. Friendships do not just happen; making and keeping friends takes effort. List the top five things you look for in a friend.

Ask your friend to make their own list. Compare the lists. Do you expect the same things? Why or why not?

Is your best friend someone you share everything with, do you enjoy listening to the same music and watching the same shows? Friends do not have to copy each other to be close. You should encourage your friends to be independent and think for themselves. Discuss the following questions with your friends:

- Are there advantages to being just like your friends? Are there disadvantages?
- What problems can come up if you are too much like your friends?
- What problems can come up if you are extremely different from your friends?

Make a plan for staying close, without becoming too dependent on your friends.
